Sugar Land Garden Club is proud to announce that **Greg Grant** will be the featured speaker at the October 18 general meeting. His topic will be, ***Heirloom Gardening in the South: Yesterday's Plants for Today's Gardens.***



Many of the plants growing in our backyards now have been brought into the marketplace by Greg Grant, a highly regarded and award winning horticulturist, author, ornamental plant developer, and lecturer. He has degrees in floriculture and horticulture from Texas A & M University and is currently a research associate for garden outreach at Stephen F. Austin State University.

Greg wrote/co-authored the books: *Heirloom Gardening in the South* (2011), *In Greg's Garden, a Pineywoods Perspective on Gardening, Nature, and Family* (2010, Kindle only), *Home Landscaping Texas* (2004), *The Southern Heirloom Garden* (1995). He writes a monthly blog for Arbor Gate Nursery in Tomball, Texas. He also writes a column, "In Greg's Garden," for the *Texas Gardener Magazine* and he contributes regularly to Neil Sperry's *Gardens* magazine.

Greg has introduced many successful plants to the Texas marketplace. They include: Blue Princess verbena, Gold Star esperanza, Henry and Augusta Deulberg sages, [John Fanick phlox](#), Laura Bush and VIP petunias, Marie Daly and Nacogdoches (Grandma's Yellow) roses, [Mary Helen Fredel crossvine](#), Pam's Pink honeysuckle, and [Stars and Stripes pentas](#) to name a few.

HORTICULTURE

Would you like to know what plants I recommend for the 2011 Garden Art & Plant Sale that our garden club will be selling this month?

My highest regards go out to my little *Cordia boissieri*, also known as Mexican Olive that I bought at our plant sale. What a trooper! It survived this summer's heat and drought with hardly dropping a leaf. This tree is just gorgeous with its silver-green leaves and white blooms. We do not want huge trees in our backyard (I need some sunlight for growing vegetables!) and this little tree fills the bill. It is beautiful, but not overwhelming.

Also these plants:

- **Justicia.** This is a "pass-a-long" plant given to me by Anne Wilson. It attracts hummingbirds and has striking orange blooms. And it is easy to propagate and to share with your fellow garden club members.
- Any variety of **lantana.** Lantanas come in all kinds of colors, but I love the golden yellow especially. They even outgrew weeds in my butterfly/hummingbird flowerbed this summer.
- **Salvia miniata:** Do not consider these to be invasive, but they are certainly prolific. Their red blooms attract hummingbirds. They are also planted outside my kitchen window in the hummingbird/butterfly flowerbed.
- **Hamelia patens** (hummingbird bush). One of my favorite plants that comes into full bloom just as the hummingbirds are starting to come through.
- **Native Turk's Cap.** It needs pruning now and then to keep it in bounds, but it is a real die-hard plant for your garden and hummingbirds love it.
- **Terri's Pink Hibiscus.** Its pink, giant blooms make it a showpiece in my backyard. Wish I had a whole hedge of these.

Here are some obituaries of plants that did not make it through this summer.

- **Marilyn's Choice Abutilon:** I placed this potted plant in my compost bin during a freeze a couple of years ago. It rooted there and loved the compost where it put down roots. But since it was behind our garage and I did not see it very much, it died from my neglect. If plants are not in your sight every day, you will forget about them.
- **Coral Vine:** This was also a compost pile plant that did not receive enough water this last summer and then died. But in the last few years, it grew upon my back fence with ferociousness. I could hardly keep it contained within my backyard. This vine was lovely, since I had both the pink and white varieties growing and intertwined together.

GARDEN CLUB PERSONALITY

Hello everyone. I am Jaye Talus, the corresponding secretary for our club. I moved to Houston in 1975 and have been living in Sugar Land for the last 20 years. I grew up in northern Minnesota. My first memory of gardening was when my Dad, who had never grown anything, decided to plant sweet corn the Indian way: six seed kernels and a fish buried in the middle of a mound of dirt -- but first we had to catch the fish!

I was a true flower child of the 70's and bought a farm outside Green Bay, Wisconsin so I could grow healthy food for my children and have horses. I wanted organic everything, even the meat, so I had two pigs (every year the pigs were named Homer and Jethro), three sheep, three goats (Nanny, Annie, and Fanny), a dozen chickens, and two ponies, which the babies were much too young to ride. I had read that goat milk was super healthy, so my kids went from breast milk to goat milk. I had never milked a goat in my life and my goats had never been milked before. That made for quite a comical and steep learning curve!

I canned or froze everything I grew. It was a fabulous first gardening experience as the large vegetable garden had about 150 years of manure plowed into the soil so twelve tomato plants yielded six bushels of tomatoes!! I bought a package of every kind of veggie seed the general store sold. It was overwhelming! I had a full root cellar, shelves of canned goods, a full freezer, and very healthy and well fed pigs! I thought gardening was wonderful and easy. (Ha!)

I now have a typical suburban yard in First Colony that had only Johnson grass weeds in the back yard, so I had told my then teenage son to dig up the clumps. When I got home from work, it was like a bomb had gone off -- craters everywhere. He spent the next day replanting all the weeds and then spraying them with weed killer! Now my garden is my stress reliever and my sanctuary (and my excuse for why the house is not clean!)

I so enjoy all activities the garden club offers and experimenting with different plants. There is always something new to learn. The field trips are fun and make it easier to get to know other great women. I also enjoy working on the social committee, volunteering at Brookwood, and doing whatever is needed at GAPS and the spring Garden Tour. If you are a new member, come join the fun!

Uh Oh! Here Come the Snakes!

Major snake infestation expected in Texas this month

"...Snake experts tell 1200 WOAI news that late August and September will see an explosion of snakes in back yards, as the critters start slithering out looking for something to eat.

"They're very hungry right now," central Texas snake expert Jerry Cates tells 1200 WOAI news, in a statement which is creepy on it's surface. "The hungrier they get, the more they start ranging the fields looking for food."

He says that's why we can expect snakes to show up in places where they are seldom seen...

He says the four most common types of poisonous snakes in Texas are the common rattlesnake, the Texas coral snake, the copperhead, and the cottonmouth (likes to hang around water...like Onion Creek)... [Note: There are no poisonous snakes in Texas - no snake will poison a person upon being eaten. However, there are venomous snakes, whose fangs inject venom into those that they bite]. The article also gives good tips when encountering a snake.

The article was sent to Keith Crenshaw, Urban Biologist in Houston for the Texas Park and Wildlife Department, for his comments. He mentioned that in our area the venomous and very distinctive coral snake has round eyes and mentioned many non-venomous snakes.

Mike Abernathy of Jesse Jones Park and Nature Center recently gave a talk on snakes and said that in the hottest part of the summer, there are less snake encounters, because they burrow in the dirt until they reach moist soil and indulge in [estivation](#) or summer sleep for the duration. [Now that the temperature is decreasing, will they come out again?]

Remember, there are many non-venomous snakes that eat rodents and other pests. Also, if you leave a snake alone, it probably will leave you alone. Click the link to read the entire [email from Eulalia's daughter](#), comments from Keith Crenshaw, and links to more snake information.
